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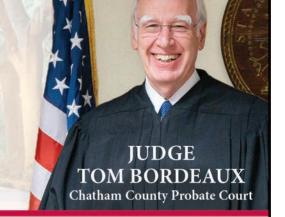

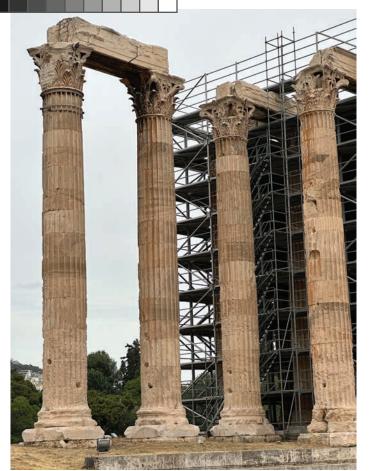

I really enjoyed your story (Up Front) on the restaurant (Al Pompiere) in the Jewish Quarter in Rome. I traveled to Italy on business for many years and discovered this restaurant from an ex-pat American. It was difficult to find, so I would offer the restaurant's card to the taxi driver and we would get there. The food and experience always exceeded my expectations.

You may agree, there is no such thing as "Italian" food, as each region has its own cuisine and wine. What has been often described as Roman food is actually Roman Jewish food. I always had the stuffed zucchini flowers (fiori di zucca) and fried artichokes, and then I'd sample what the restaurant had to offer. The Frascati wine was inexpensive and prefect for a Roman meal.

I have referred Al Pompiere to several friends over the years, but some came away unhappy because the waiter wasn't accustomed to dealing with diners that didn't speak Italian. Your readers should be advised of this and be patient with the service. Finally, diners should ask the restaurant to order a taxi as they depart since it might be hard to find one on the streets nearby.

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JUST FLAGGING THIS

Reader Peter Mezei provides the following framework from The Etiquette School of America for proper treatment of the American Flag, as Memorial Day is approaching:

Any time you're at an event (a parade, football game half-time show, Boy or Girl Scout ceremony, church, or school event, or such) and the flag passes you, stand up as you see it come into your line of vision. Follow all the protocols of listening to the National Anthem. And remain standing until the flag has passed you and your family or

The flag does not belong to any one American. It's a shared symbol of our nation. It should only be at half-mast by presidential or gubernatorial order, even when mourning a soldier killed in the line of duty. A person may not correctly decide to fly our national symbol at half-mast for personal reasons.

Any time you see the flag being raised or lowered, stop to watch, remain silent, remove your hat, and place your right hand over your



Light must always shine on our flag. It must never fly in darkness. If you have one flying outside your home, either lower it and bring it inside before sunset each evening or have a light installed to shine on it throughout

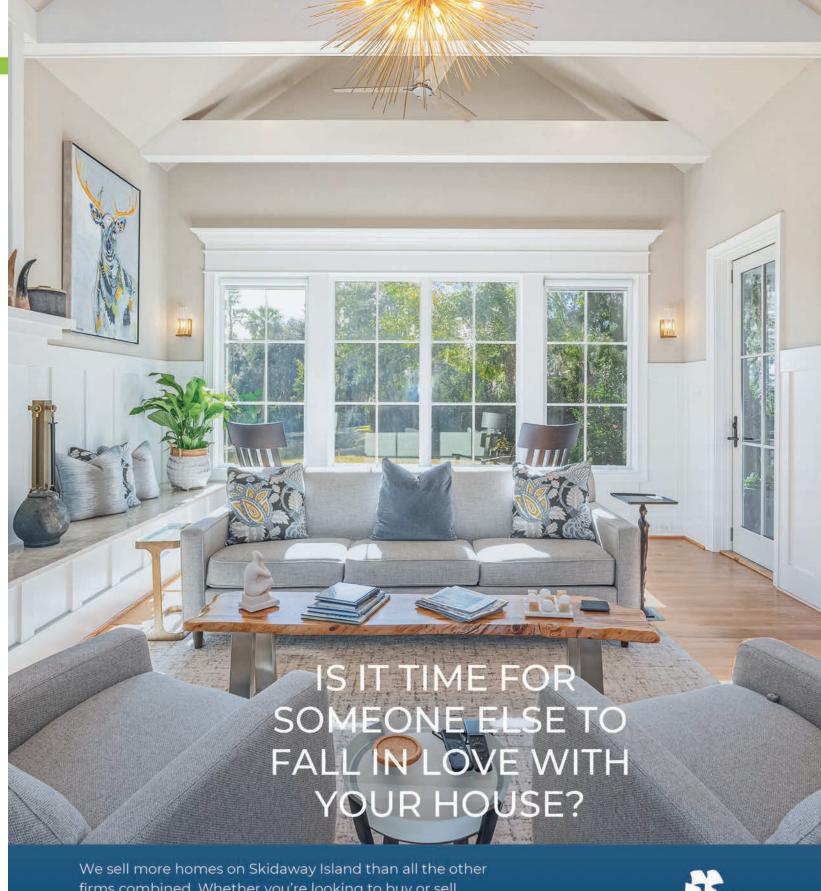
The flag isn't dipped (lowered) to any person or thing.

On U.S. soil, our flag always should be given the place of honor among other flags. It should be put on a stage in a room to its righthand side. No other flag may be larger in size, be on a taller flagpole, or raised higher. The U.S. flag will be the first one raised and the last one lowered. (It is to be raised briskly and lowered slowly.)

When displayed on a wall, the flag may be hung either vertically or horizontally. In either case, the stars should be at the top and to the observer's left.

All flags displayed for general use (those not of historical significance) should be clean and tatter-free. When it's time to retire a flag, there are precise protocols. American Legion posts and Boy Scout troops hold occasional ceremonies in which the flag is correctly burned (retired). Contact your local chapter for details on when their next service will be held. One will often occur on Flag Day, June 14.

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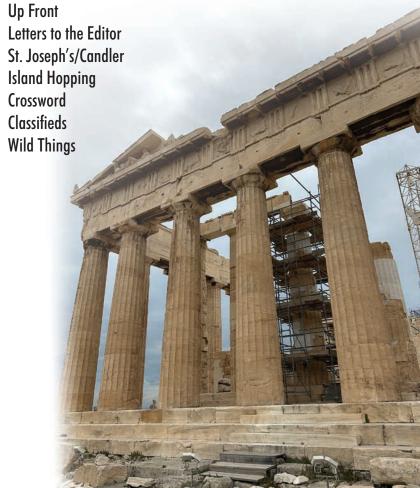

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DIGGIN TIN To Till or Not to Till

Tt's easy to believe that the most extraordinary gardens and yards are the result of Long hours and meticulous attention. Successful gardeners are traditionally hard-working, devoting hours, days, and weeks to toil in the soil. For those who may lack the time and energy to devote such time, a no-till garden can be a labor-saving option.

A "no-till" covers the top layer of soil is covered with organic mulch material rather than digging or tilling it. Gardening in the same spot, year after year, is easier if you do not disturb the soil with constant digging and tilling. Roots in a tilled garden always hit the hard core at a certain depth, then split and compete. Even though tilling can help you plant an immediate garden, it can ruin your garden soil in the long

THE BENEFITS

Soil is a living organism full of natural fungi, worms, and microbes. The roots of plants in the soil communicate with each other, encouraging growth by sharing resources, enabling very dense forests to thrive. Too much tilling will interrupt that natural system. Worms get killed, and bare soil is eroded by wind and rain, requiring several years for recovery.

> What works in nature also works beautifully in the home garden. There are several different no-till methods to choose from, due to varying climates and soil qualities. It may take a little research to find what works best for you. Despite such challenges, it can really pay off over time because beneficial insects and bacteria take over the work for you. In the following years, the health of your soil will get better.

PLANTING

As soon as the soil is workable, start plant-



weeding and harvesting everything at the same time, as well. For this reason, it's less labor-intensive to plant in succession as the season progresses.

Plants love to grow together and support each other, so planting more densely can help reduce weeds. If you're growing vegetables, plant squash and spinach together; cabbage and beets; cucumbers and radishes. Before the bigger plant will need the space, the small one will be harvested, but you will not have to weed as much in the process.

MULCH

Mulch is required every year. Late autumn, after the growing season ends, is the best time to apply mulch for most home gardens. That's also the time when nature covers the soil, and the soil is bare, dry, and hard. A well-mulched garden doesn't require as much watering as other soil, as the mulch helps retain moisture.

Layer your garden with natural material on top of the existing soil without working it in. Most gardeners suggest covering the area with cardboard and/or newspaper, then adding compost and mulch to build healthy soil for the next spring, and repeat. You will need one to two inches of compost mulch to create healthier soil, preserve moisture, and prevent erosion. Composting can be a lot of work, but it doesn't have to be. Compost bins can be constructed from old pallets or building scraps. Two are recommended; while one is being filled, the other has time to mature. Layering green and brown will prevent the bins from smelling as it composts on its own over time.

Natural mulch such as compost, rotted manure, wood chips, or grass clippings has an advantage in that it decomposes and enriches the soil. Seed-free hay or straw also make good natural cover. They both decom-

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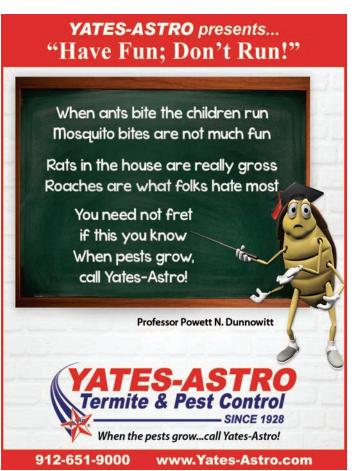
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pose quickly and enrich the soil in the process. Make sure to break up the straw so it is light and airy.

Most no-till methods only work with a good layer of mulch, but any garden can benefit. In nature, soil is always covered, never exposed, with dead grass, leaves, and branches that have fallen to the ground, creating a soil food web. When the garden matures, you might be able to skip a year to review the soil quality.

AVOIDING WEEDS

In nature, nothing is uncovered, so weeds are a natural mechanism to protect the soil. If the ground is not covered by useful plants or mulch, more weeds can thrive. So don't stress if there are some weeds, but don't let them take over the garden, either. If you weed regularly a little, you will never have to weed the whole garden at once. Paying special attention at planting time, there will not be much to worry about during the growing season.

An easy way to kill weeds – or almost any plant – is to cut off the top. A plant with no leaves above ground will die, starving the roots because no photosynthesis takes place. Some weeds are more aggressive than others. If you have lots of weeds that spread by roots (such as quackgrass), it is helpful to separate the garden area from the rest of the yard by installing a weed barrier border, about a foot deep. This will help prevent these weeds coming into the garden. Weed control fabric is another option, but not permanently under the mulch, just on top of the soil as a cover.

One weed plant produces hundreds of seeds. However, hoeing breaks up the soil, bringing more seeds to the surface to germinate. Even worse is hoeing for root-propagated weeds. The more you chop the roots, the

more plants are multiplied. Instead, a garden fork is recommended to turn the soil, loosening it just enough to get the weeds out, hopefully pulling the root system with it.

If your soil is mulched and healthy, getting all those roots out should be easy. If not, and the soil is too compacted, more mulch is required. Weeds pulled by hand can be composted. Just be sure that your compost is hot enough to kill strong roots, and/or seeds. Otherwise, discard the weeds into the garbage can or burn them. Weeding by hand also allows you to feel the quality of your soil.

It can be tempting to abandon weeding, especially at the end of the growing season. But this only seeds a garden of weeds for next year. If you give the weeds no chance to go to seeds you will see how much fewer weeds there will be next year.

WATER, WATER

Establishing young plants can be challenging. By planting a seedling into a dry hole and watering from above, the plant will develop shallow roots, always seeking more water. Instead, it's better to water the hole before planting the seedling, so the roots will grow deep to reach the water. This helps young plants find moisture in deep soil on their own.

Even an easy garden does not get done by sitting in a rocking chair. No, you must get out there and give it some attention, 20 to 60 minutes a day is a reasonable allotment. Plant a bit, harvest a bit, take care of some weeds, and add compost. It may not seem like much, but if the little things aren't taken care, they will accumulate. Consistency is the key to providing a manageable garden for years to come.



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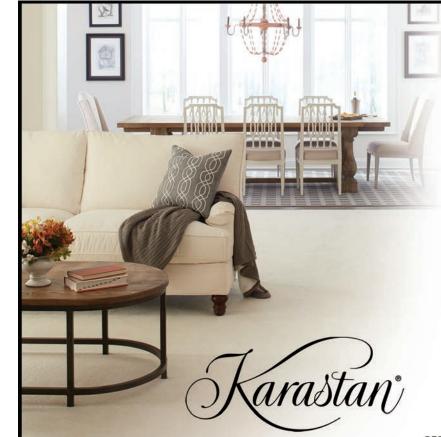

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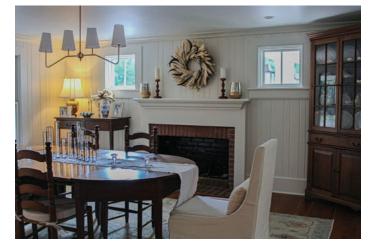

Steven Greer, MD, with St. Joseph's/ Candler Physician Network - Bone, Joint and Muscle Care - doesn't tell his patients to stop doing things. "That's not my job," he says. "Our job as physicians is to help people do the things they want to do."

Your joints are your body's shock absorbers. But if you have arthritis, the joints may now be a source of pain, swelling, or stiffness when you try to do physical activities. Stopping activities isn't the answer, as doing so can lead to deconditioning, which raises the risk for obesity and other conditions like high blood pressure and di-

abetes. Weight gain, in turn, puts more pressure on the joints. Often, the best prescription is exercise.

"With many musculoskeletal issues, we can use your muscles to take the pressure off of your joints," Greer explains. "I do a lot of exercise prescriptions. Walking is good for arthritis. Research has found that running is good for preventing arthritis – your body responds to running by making thicker cartilage for your joints."

Pool therapy can be effective for some patients. "The buoyancy of the water takes the pressure off of the joints, so the exercises don't hurt



as much," Greer says. "Also, moving underwater requires more of your muscles, making you stronger faster, which alleviates your pain faster."

If you're over the age of 45, Greer recommends you consult your primary care doctor before starting an exercise program. "Everyone is healthy enough to start a program, but it's a matter of how you do it and what exercises are safe for you."

Greer can also employ medications, supplements, and other conservative treatments to help strengthen joints and decrease pain. A compound of glucosamine and chondroitin has been shown to help about 60 percent of patients. "These are basically what your body uses to make joint fluid and cartilage," Greer says. "Your body uses them as building blocks, so they may take a month or more to fully work. But once they are back doing their favorite things, many of my patients are glad they tried this option."

Greer can administer steroid injections into the joint to alleviate arthritis pain. Another type of injection is known as viscosupplementation treatment, in which a thick fluid called hyaluronic acid acts as a coating for the cartilage that helps bones move together smoothly.

Other treatment options include topical creams, anti-inflammatory supplements, and chemical mixtures known as unsaponifiables, to reduce swelling. Sometimes plain, old acetaminophen can help.

Born in Bowleys Quarters, near Baltimore, Beatty entered the religious life at 19 when she joined the Sisters of Mercy, an international community of Roman Catholic women who dedicate their lives to the Gospel of Jesus, taking vows of poverty, chastity, obedience, and service. She earned an English teaching degree from Mount Saint Agnes College and a masters in English literature from Marquette University. Her first assignment was in Columbus, Georgia, teaching English and religion at Pacelli High School. She then returned to Baltimore to teach at Mercy High School.

During that time, "Sister Margie," as she's fondly known, volunteered in the city jail as a chaplain to women, which became her fulltime job for eight years. She helped launch the successful Marian House in Baltimore, a residence and training program for women released from jail, prison, or psychiatric hos-

Beatty was elected to the provincial coun-

cil of the Sisters of Mercy, governing an area from Baltimore to Alabama. She served as president of the Province of Baltimore from 1982 to 2000.

Beatty served on the board of trustees at St. Joseph's Hospital before the joint operating agreement with Candler Hospital was conceived. From 2001 to 2022, she was the health system's vice president of mission services, guiding community outreach. She grew small pilot initiatives into major health programs, including St. Mary's Community Center, St. Mary's Health Center, and Good Samaritan Clinic.

Beatty has served and provided leadership to many Savannah organizations, including the Georgia Infirmary, MedBank Foundations, Inc., Mercy Housing, and Step-Up Savannah. She is a member of the board of trustees of Mercy Hospital in Baltimore.

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"If something is really important to you – say tennis, for example - we'll figure out ways to make it not hurt so much when you play," Greer says. "You may not be able to play in the exact same manner that you used to. You may have to modify your serve or make other changes, but we'll get you on the court with a racquet in your hand."

Greer wants people to think of exercise as medicine early in their adult lives. This may not only prevent pain but will prepare patients

for active lives into older age, and for after surgery. "Once you have arthritis in your knee, if you are lucky enough to live a long time after that, you're going end up needing a knee replacement," Greer notes. "That's why it's crucial to become active sooner rather than later, and to not let joint pain end your activities. You want to be in a position in life that if you do need surgery, you'll be ready for it and you'll

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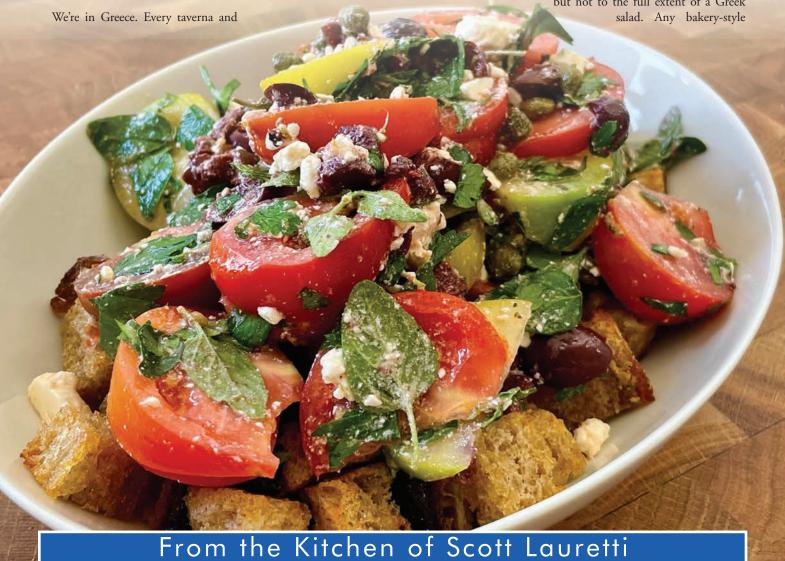

Think about coffee. An "Americano" is a name devised by Italians. It refers to espresso, made bigger with the addition of hot water, to fill a large cup that is familiar to an American. So, in essence, it's an Italian drink altered to accommodate American tastes. But it has become popular in America, too. So, Americans, in America, will order an Italian drink that has been created to accommodate American tastes: "I'll take an Americano," you might say to your server at Cutters Point, although the shop has plenty of good, old American coffee at the ready for you.

→ood nomenclature is idiosyncratically influenced by one's point restaurant menu I have been presented includes "Greek Salad." If I were to ask for "a salad" without the geopolitical modifier, what would I get? Do Greeks call the thing we have come to know as a Greek salad "Greek Salad," or is doing so redundant? I have no way of knowing because the local language is "all Greek to me."

> In addition to the ubiquitous Greek salad, a Cretan salad almost always appears as the next line on menus here. This is a variation on the well-known national raw vegetable dish. It relies upon barley rusks for its identity, and often substitutes goat cheese for common feta. A barley rusk is like a chunk of crusty, rustic whole wheat bread. Purists might argue that a proper Cretan salad forsakes all greenery, relying only on tomatoes, rusks, and cheese. My recipe violates this stricture, but not to the full extent of a Greek



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whole wheat loaf will substitute adequately for rusks. I intentionally omit quantities, so you can experiment to suit personal preference. It's the what and the how that are relevant. Kali orexi (forgive the missing accent marks)!

Tomatoes, meaty and ripe
Barley rusks (or sturdy whole wheat bread)
Black olives
Capers, drained and rinsed
Arugula, not too much
Red onion, thinly sliced
Green pepper, thinly sliced
Oregano – dried (Greek, preferred)
Extra virgin olive oil
Red wine vinegar
Goat cheese, crumbled
Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Make the dressing: Toss oregano, salt, and pepper into a small mixing bowl. Add red wine vinegar. Whisk briskly to combine. Slowly whisk in olive oil, stirring vigorously, to combine well and emulsify.

Tear the bread into small pieces. On a box grater, using the largest openings, grate the tomatoes into a pile of pulp. Toss the tomato pulp and its juices into a large bowl. Add the torn bread, season with salt, and toss to mix well. Add the remaining ingredients except for the cheese, season again with salt and pepper, add the dressing, and toss well to coat evenly, making sure the bread is moistened and soft. Top with crumbled cheese.

SAFE AND SOUND

AFE Shelter's executive director, Shannon Bates, wishes she were out of a job. She dreams of someday finding the 48-bed shelter for victims of intimate-partner violence and their children empty, that someday domestic violence will not harm nearly 20 people per minute in the U.S.

Until that day, she appreciates that many conscientious Landings residents support the organization.

Savannah's SAFE (Savannah Area Family Emergency) Shelter is Georgia's second largest domestic-violence shelter, serving about 1,800 people annually. Landings resident Norma Brewin petitioned her neighbors for donations to start the shelter in 1979 after watching a movie about domestic violence victims. Along the way, she recruited fellow Skidaway residents Lucy Brannan, Caroline Armstrong, and Dr. Harris Lentini. Since SAFE Shelter's founding 45 years ago, the Landings has consistently offered its support through executive guidance, volunteerism, and fundraising.

Recently, Savannah Philanthropic Partners (SPP) donated \$50,000 to SAFE Shelter. The group was founded in 2021 by four Landings residents – Jean Ahrens, two-time past president of SAFE Shelter's board of directors, and fellow SAFE Shelter board members Sheila Grossman, Lorraine Boice, and Linda Huntoon. SPP's mission is to support causes involving women, children, and underserved populations. It now includes more than 40 women who pool their charitable donations to make significant impacts on worthy organizations.

Ahrens says the group chose SAFE Shelter for its annual gift because the organization helps so www.theskinnie.com



needs of the situation, but they also offer counseling to the children to hopefully stop the cycle of violence," Ahrens says. "In addition, they offer counseling for women and a follow-up program of transitional housing and employment assistance to help them become financially secure and no longer dependent on their abusers."

Ahrens has joined many Landings-led efforts to help SAFE Shelter. One group started the shelter's summer camp program for children, which offers

counseling, tutors, and outings to the zoo, beach, or other locations. Another group of Landings women redecorated all the rooms at the shelter. Boice's donation was instrumental in developing the Yes Center for Teens.

Landings residents also initiated the annual gala, which raises about \$200,000 per year. The Skidaway Community Church supports Safe Shelter with its annual April document-shredding event. On May 5, SAFE Shelter's inaugural Bingo and Bubbly Brunch fundraiser at the Palmetto Club attracted 269 Landings resi-

"Since the birth of SAFE Shelter by Landings residents, this very special community continues to support us in many ways," Bates comments. "There are several clubs, groups, churches, and individuals from the Landings who donate money, time, supplies, food, and initiate fundraisers on our behalf. We are honored to have the involvement of such compassionate and caring members of our community."

Directing SAFE Shelter is the capstone of Bates' personal and professional life. Having spent more than two decades working in Savannah's non-profit sector, including positions at Union Mission, Lowcountry Legal Volunteers, and the American Cancer Society, Bates felt capable of tackling the issue she felt powerless to control as a child. Her own mother

was abused.

"When I was little, I couldn't do anything to help because I was just a kid, but now I have lots of ways to help," she says. "I want this place to be somewhere someone like my mom could feel respected and empowered."

Most days, SAFE Shelter is at capacity, with a waiting list. Intimate-partner violence increased during the pandemic and Savannah's growing population and crime density have contributed to overcrowding

"Domestic violence is not restricted to any one population," Bates explains. "We have helped people from all over the area – every zip code."

With continued commitment from long-time Landings supporters, Bates knows that she, along with her caring board of directors and her hardworking staff, can handle the overcrowding challenge. SAFE Shelter is launching a capacity-building campaign in the fall. In honor of its 45-year history, SAFE Shelter is seeking 45 women to join the Women's Leadership Guild. These women will help raise money for the organization, provide speaking opportunities, make important introductions, or other means. Bates says many women from the Landings have already expressed interest in the guild initiative because of their passion for supporting other women.

"Our growth to meet the community needs is imminent and we need to start fundraising, planning, and relationship-building now to pave the way for the next five years," Bates says. "We were started by the Landings, we've continued to receive support from the Landings, and residents at the Landings have pledged their future support. We are so grateful."

A Tale of Ships By Ron Lauretti

s other features in this issue of *The Skinnie* suggest, we are sentimental for old things. We romanticize bygone days and treasure the simple elegance of antiques. But we also recognize the impact of the torrents of progress. Two naval ships, the *Santa Maria* and the *USS Gerald R. Ford*, are extreme opposites in almost every way. Scientists argue that 525 years represents a span of 19 generations. That's the time between Columbus's most famous voyage and the commissioning of the largest warship on the planet. Here's an illustration of how much nautical evolution occurs as 19 generations pass.

THE SANTA MARIA

The *Santa Maria* was only 62 feet long – small, even by 15th Century standards. Captained by Christopher Columbus, the Spanish galleon set sail from Palos, on the southern coast of Spain, on August 3, 1492. Accompanied by two smaller vessels – the

Nina and the *Pinta* – its mission was to search for a shorter maritime trade route to Asia.

At the time, much of the world remained unexplored by Europeans. Many people believed the world was flat and multisided, not round. Therefore, sailors feared if they journeyed too far from shore their ships would sail over an edge and perish in a free-fall. Sailors of the time also believed that giant, ferocious monsters were hidden in the depths of the ocean – creatures that would sink ships and devour their crews. Maritime exploration was a hazardous business.

The *Santa Maria* carried a crew of 40 men crowded into a small cabin area. Most of the men slept on the open deck, exposed to the elements. For defense, the vessel had no deck guns or cannons, only the personal blades or lances each sailor carried.

Three cloth sails of varying sizes, one for

each of the ship's mast, provided the *Santa Maria's* power. Her hull was hewn from wood.

Meals were served twice daily. Only food that would not spoil without refrigeration, such as salted or cured beef, pork, cod or sardines, could be stored onboard. Without a healthy supply of fruits and vegetables, scurvy was a common affliction.

On Christmas Day, 1492, while exploring the uncharted waters off what is now Haiti, the *Santa Maria* ran aground on a reef and suffered a total loss. But Columbus, a man of both good luck and dogged determination, survived the disaster and returned to Spain on the *Nina*. He made three more voyages to the Americas between 1493 and 1504.

THE GERALD R. FORD (CVN-78)

The *Gerald R. Ford* is the largest warship ever constructed – 1,092 feet in length. Originally commanded by Capt. John F. Meier, the

aircraft carrier was launched October 11, 2013, and in-water testing began. In July of 2017, Pres. Donald Trump formally commissioned the ship. In October of 2022, she deployed for her first mission.

Each member of the crew of 4,539 people – which includes the personnel of an air wing – is provided a storage locker area below decks and a rotating assignment for sleep in a nearby bunk. Using nuclear reactor technology, the *Ford* generates its own electrical power and provides a full complement of healthy and delicious meals prepared by highly trained cooks three times daily.

Equipped for deployment to anywhere in the world, *Ford* has a multilevel enclosed control tower loaded with radar-activated surface-to-air missiles and multiple 25-mm and .50-caliber machine gun stations. These weapons form a protective barrier that makes it virtually impossible for an enemy projectile to reach the great carrier.

On board, there are up to 75 aircraft (mostly supersonic jets) ready to defend against any potential threat or deliver lethal power to any target. When on a specific operation, the aircraft carrier is escorted by a complete military defensive convoy system, including a protective submarine.

Estimates suggest the *Ford* cost \$17.5 billion to build, including close to \$5 billion in research-and-development expenses. She is named for the 38th president of the U.S., who served in the Navy aboard an aircraft carrier in the Pacific Theater during World War II. Ford was living at the time the decision to name the vessel was made, making it the only warship to honor a living person.

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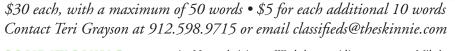
