

I'm a girl-dad. Which - I'm generalizing - is more expensive than being a boy-dad. This truth is most evident when the girl(s) get married. Throwing a wedding is like building a house. There's a budget. And there's the amount you spend. And the two figures are, at best, distant relations. The "budget" is the baby that organically and without fail grows into its much larger self. The same way your kids grow relentlessly, as much as you'd prefer otherwise, before your anguished eyes. These are fundamental elements of the implicit bargain you make with the universe in exchange for the privilege of parenthood.

My little girl got married. My dread was the inverse of her euphoria. Aside from the economics, weddings are not comfortable for me. I'm apprehensive in social settings. I don't drink. I'm not great at small talk. Once I start eating, it's hard from me to stop. I'm not much of a dancer. I rarely tuck my shirts inside my pants. I shave, at most, once a week. My hair was at an awkward in-between length.

When your girl is the bride, the stakes are rich. You're giving a speech...perhaps the most important one of your life. I've observed fathers-of-the-bride (FOBs). Many prep for THE moment for months. Writing and rewriting and rehearsing, time and again. Not me. I'm a deadline-junkie. Take this column: I sit myself in front of my laptop about 90-minutes before our printer's drop-dead time and type. The process works when the outcome is an inconsequential essay. When it's the ultimate love letter to your precious progeny, procrastination is a fool's device.

So, there I was, Saturday, May 4, in my pajamas, at my desk. Hairstylists and makeup artists and young women in custom, matching sleepwear flitted about my house. I sought refuge in my carriage-house office. I was holding a cup of coffee and holding a panic attack at bay.

Fast forward. The wedding reception ended as abruptly as an untimely death. I was relieved. But I was also sad that it was forever finished and elated that it was more magical than my most ambitious dreams. Surprisingly, being an FOB is among the handful of life's most indescribably amazing experiences... When someone opened a door and I saw my

I said many things to my daughter that day. These are among my favorite words:





ASquare Deal

n February 10th of this year, an event took place in the Historic District that had never occurred in any living person's memory: The ceremonial renaming of one of Savannah's 24 squares. Taylor Square was awash with people delighted to witness the renaming of a Savannah square in honor of a woman of color.

The official renaming had taken place earlier, in two phases. November of 2022 found Savannah's City Council voting unanimously to remove John C. Calhoun as the namesake of the southernmost square on Abercorn Street. In a separate action in August of 2023, the temporarily nameless space was re-christened Susie King Taylor Square.

Bureaucratically, the Savannah City Council acted under the advisement of two appointed citizens' commissions: Park and Tree, and Historic Sites and Monuments. Although Council is not obliged to follow the recommendations of either commission, the advisory groups frequently hold sway. The commissions typically take up their work through grassroots organizing – pavement-pounding, awareness-building, and petition-signing. In this case, the Susie King Taylor Center for Jubilee, spearheaded by "Sistah" Patt Gunn, used a multi-year effort to replace the name Calhoun with that of Taylor.

These processes were neither direct vectors nor simple achievements. Residents of the square had to weigh in at least 50 percent in favor before any action could move forward. Achieving that goal was not easy. Confusion over the locations of two long unmarked cemeteries – one for "strangers" and the other for African Americans – which lie under Calhoun and Whitefield Squares, respectively, led to concerns over which square demanded the more immediate renaming. The public-awareness phase sometimes generated more heat than light, but eventually Gunn and her growing cadre of supporters won over Park and Tree, Historic Sites and Monuments, and City Council.


Racially, the crowd in Taylor Square was evenly divided. One city official speaking from the rostrum encouraged people to "look around: this is what Savannah looks like." Indeed, 54 percent of Savannah's population is Black, and the city's nine-member council includes five Black women. Mayor Van Johnson, an African American man, made one of very few references to John C. Calhoun, the outgoing namesake: "What he stood for is not what Savannah stands for."

Taylor Square

In 1856, on the eve of the American Civil War, Savannahians named one of the city's final two squares for Calhoun, who had died six years prior. A native of South Carolina, he served in three different presidential cabinets, and was vice president for eight years. In 1845, he was elected to the senate, a seat he held until his death. Calhoun embodied the prevailing sentiment the 1850s, but his beliefs don't stand up to current standards of humanity. A Democrat, he championed the prerogative of the states to determine their own stance on the issue of slavery and the right of American citizens to transport their "property" anywhere in the nation, including into the western territories. Calhoun also represented a new racism that characterized

19th Century America. In the 1700s, even slavery apologists frequently called it a "necessary evil." But there was no apology in Calhoun's vernacular; slavery, he declared, was a "positive good," elevating both the enslaved, who had no other hope for "civilization," and the enslaver, whose elite class in the American South was unprecedented.

Conversely, the selfless heroism of Susie King Taylor better reflects the values of current generations. Born into slavery in 1848, she learned to read and write, a crime in antebellum Georgia. Near the start of the Civil War, she made her way from Savannah to South Carolina, where she offered her services – daytime laundress and nighttime literacy tutor – to the First South Carolina Volunteer Infantry Regiment, one of the era's "colored" troop configurations. Most importantly to history, Taylor penned a memoir about her time with the military, providing the most

complete account of life in camp during the Civil War.

Savannah has frequently named squares for people of national (even international) importance: Washington, Franklin, Lafayette, Madison, and Pulaski. Several speakers at the February dedication noted that 140 years had passed since the previous renaming of a Savannah square. Since Colonial times, St. James's Place payed homage to the royal residence in London. In the 1880s, with Georgia's fealty to Great Britain in the distant past, everyone seemed to agree that the Telfair family – especially the philanthropic and longest-lived matriarch, Mary Telfair – merited the renaming of the square on which

their majestic residence stood. The home was about to be transformed into the first art museum in the Southeast. There's no evidence of any dissent regarding the soon-to-be-dismissed name of a London landmark.

Nor were there Loyalists around to object when Savannah's city leaders changed the names of three streets after the American Revolution. Royal appellations were discarded in favor of more democratic words: King Street became President; Queen Street, Congress; and Prince Street, State. York Street, named for the Duke of York, retained its aristocratic name. Savannah also decided to keep all three of His Majesty's royal governors as the names of squares: Reynolds, Ellis, and Wright – which had been known first as Percival Square, named for the first president of the Georgia Trustees. Name changes came early, public protest or not.





Criticism for name-changes seems to be a modern phenomenon. Indignant voices decry "erasing history" as Confederate monuments come down, public schools and military bases shed their Confederate badges, and cities and towns re-examine the names previous generations placed on public places. A gentleman at a recent Savannah gathering claimed (during the question-and-answer period) that Yale University had "erased history" by expunging Calhoun's name from a campus building. "Now there's no record that Calhoun ever had anything to do with Yale," pled the man. However, to effectively erase the history of Calhoun's studies at Yale College (as it was called in 1802), a miscreant would have to physically blot out Calhoun's name from the university's historical records. Even then, those documents are no doubt replicated in online archives, Calhoun family papers, and numerous biographies.

Monuments, buildings, and the names of squares are not where or how people study history. History – that rich reservoir of facts, attitudes, arguments, and theories of the past - is found in scholarship. That is, in well-maintained records rooms, deeply researched documentary films, and lectures by professional historians and educators. The only history to be gleaned from a monument or a square name is not about the named person but, rather, what a particular community at a particular time had on its collective mind and held up for esteem. Naming a place for someone does less to educate than to elevate.

In an August 25, 2023, NBC News interview, Mayor Johnson said, "It's one thing to make history. It's something else to make sense. And in this case, we're making both.

Savannah plans to erect a small plaque in Taylor Square, identifying Calhoun as the erstwhile name of the square and explaining when, how, and why the change took place. As if on cue in response to detractors,



He Served by Ron Lauretti

Col. Paul Whitaker

or more than 30 years, Paul Whitaker served as a pilot for the U.S. Army. He logged many hours as a flight commander of a CH-47 Chinook helicopter, his favorite assignment.

Born and raised in Johnson City, Tennessee, Whitaker graduated high school in 1966. He enrolled at East Tennessee State University, where he was an Army R.O.T.C. student. After earning his bachelor's degree in 1970, he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Army and began his four-year active-duty obligation (which he later extended into a full career). Because he was a distinguished graduate, Whitaker had his choice of duty stations, selecting Kitzingen, Germany, where elements of the 3rd Infantry Division were stationed.


After orientation to artillery duty and promotion to first lieutenant, he enrolled in the infantry officer basic course at Fort Benning, Georgia. Anxious to fly helicopters, Whitaker was soon accepted to flight school, and trained at Fort Rucker, Alabama. He then joined the 159th Aviation Battalion at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, doubling as the battalion operations officer and a team pilot pulling double shifts. "Loved the flight time," he recalls with a smile.

Whitaker eventually returned to Fort Benning to complete the Advanced Course for Infantry Officers. He made the Commandant's List (class honors) and earned assignment to the 19th Aviation Battalion near the demilitarized zone (DMZ) in Korea. Armed violations of the truce were frequent by both sides, and Whitaker flew cautiously. Following his 18-month Korean tour, he returned to Fort Benning where he was promoted to captain. He flew with the 121st Aviation Company, a combat-ready unit specializing in infantry support.

Whitaker's next assignment required both judgement and diplomacy. For three years, he was posted to the Pentagon, where he conducted interviews with hundreds of aviation branch officers. Whitaker assigned each one to their next duty station, often a challenging job. Not only did consider the soldiers' personal preferences, but he also had to try to match them to the Army's needs.

For the remainder of his career, Whitaker flew helicopters on-andoff between duty assignments, executing missions that included supporting major infantry operations. On the ground, he worked as a garrison commander and inspector general, among other administrative tasks.

Rising through the ranks, Whitaker aced the Officer Advance Course at Fort Benning, finishing in the uppermost 20 percent of his class, again earning a spot on the Commandant's List.

Following another tour at Fort Campbell as staff operations officer for a combat aviation battalion, Whitaker completed the U.S. primary and advanced flight training courses for fixed-wing aviation pilots at Fort Wolters, Texas, and Fort Rucker, Alabama. He ranked in the top 10 percent of his class and was recommended to return as a flight instructor. He also was selected to transition to the Chinook heavy-lift birds.

The two years beginning in April of 1991 were busy for Whita-ker. As the commander of the Rapid Deployment Combat Aviation Force based at Hunter Army Airfield, he directed all aspects of operations for security issues of the 500 personnel and 58 aircraft under his command. The unit deployed worldwide during the time, including peacekeeping missions in Somalia, drug interdiction in Honduras, and hurricane disaster relief in the Caribbean. They exceeded all performance objectives and operated within budget, without a major accident, injury, or fatality.

Promoted to "full bird" colonel, Whitaker served as deputy inspector general for the U.S. Pacific Command from 1993 to 1996. He

helped plan and execute evaluations of the major exercises in the Pacific, involving more than 100,000 military personnel and numerous ships and aircraft.

Winding down an outstanding career, it was back to the R.O.T.C. ranks, supervising and supporting 28,000 cadets at 283 colleges and universities for the next four years, while returning an overrun of \$5 million dollars to the U.S. Treasury.

As an active field officer during his career, Whitaker was always supportive of general good health for those under his command. Prior to his retirement, he served as deputy commander of the Craven Army Health Clinic at Fort Monroe, Virginia.

August 31, 2011, was a proud but melancholy day for Whitaker. He retired from Army with more than 30 years of distinguished service to his credit and 19 awards and decorations attached to his dress

In 2012, Whitaker became team leader and special investigator for the former U.S. Investigations Services. For seven years, he was the direct supervisor for 25 full-time and eight contract investigators conducting federal background investigations. He supervised investigations for the military, the FBI, the Secret Service, and the Customs and Border Patrol.

Whitaker now lives a busy retired life in the Savannah area, contributing to a variety of organizations and causes. Since 2009, he has been a board member of the Tybrisa Beach Resort Condominium Association on Tybee Island, fighting for a fair insurance settlement related to damage caused by the 2016 Hurricane Mathew. He is currently the president and CEO of the association. He is an active Mason, Shriner, and member of the American Legion.

Whitaker credits his wife, Jilly, for being an outstanding military spouse and a great and supportive partner. The couple has a son and a daughter and three grandsons.
