



I find myself at the confluence of three significant events. These are they.

First – the ask.

Horizons Savannah is a not-for-profit organization with a clear mission: We partner with youth, their families, and the community to enrich the lives of students through the joy of learning, while developing the skills for success and inspiration to reach their dreams. The program features time-and-researchtested components that differentiate it from other educational interventions. At its core: Six weeks of full-day classroom instruction, recreational activities, cultural exploration, and relationship-building.

For a while, I was chair of the Horizons Savannah's board, humbly succeeding longtime Skidaway resident, Tom Oxnard, in the

role. Now, I am a middle school English teacher in the program, so I have witnessed the work (and the magic) from different points of view.

Kids come to the program from various Savannah public schools. While they face common socioeconomic challenges, they also share the basic human desires for con-

nection, growth, and fun. Horizons kids are eligible to join the program as kindergartners and can remain (the vast majority do) yearafter-year through high school graduation. Many return to the program after their high school years to work as volunteers or professional teachers as young adults.

Horizons operates at the generous invitation of local independent host schools - Savannah Country Day, Bethesda Academy, and Savannah Christian. Horizons students enjoy the resources that these institutions provide as program sites. Young people from host schools volunteer as classroom and activity assistants. Horizons brings people to-

gether from disparate circumstances who might never otherwise meet. These connections demystify perceived differences and create valuable lifetime bonds.

Horizons teaches kids to swim. Swimming is both a survival skill and an esteem-building activity, especially for kids who have never dipped a toe in water before. Horizons fields a swim team in the local league, another way to connect families from different backgrounds with one another.

The program works. Horizons kids' reading and math standardized test scores, measured at the beginning and end of the summer session, significantly improve, in stark contrast to many of their non-Horizons peers.

As a teacher, I have celebrated little wins (a hesitant kid suddenly blossoms as she reads aloud to the class), and I lament the challenges ("Put your phone away; you're wasting your time and you're wasting mine"). It's an incredible privilege to have a chance to positively impact a kid.

Horizons Savannah depends on people like you. We employ professional teachers and

> limit teacher/student ratios to 15:1. We feed our kids - breakfast, lunch, and snacks – ever day. We transport them using contracted buses. We operate all day, five days a week, for six weeks in summer, and we supplement the core session with ongoing engagement throughout the school year. We take five field trips. We offer a variety of clubs. And we

do it all for a cost of approximately \$2,000 per student for the entire year. This summer, we will welcome approximately 300 students, while more than 100 remain on our waiting list. Our capacity is limited only by our ability to fundraise.

Horizons Giving Day is our single most-important fundraising initiative each year. "Day" is misleading. The actual day is May 15, but the campaign spans the entire month of May and beyond. It's open now.

I have studied many social impact groups I am confident Horizons is among the very best (and offers the greatest return on your

Kathy Levitt

A Life of Service

iven the scope of Kathy Levitt's contributions to the people of Savannah, it's no surprise the Skidaway resident is being honored for her extraordinary service to the community. What is surprising is that it hasn't come sooner. On May 9, the "Legends, Leaders and Life Well-Lived Luncheon" will recognize Levitt for her commitment to building a better tomorrow for Savannahians of all ages. Hosted by Senior Citizens, Inc. (SCI), the annual event pays tribute to three area residents who have contributed significantly to our community, inspired others through their service, and exemplified a life well-lived. The other honorees are Sister Margaret Beatty, R.S.M, and Cliff McCurry.

On the Senior Citizens, Inc. Facebook page, Levitt is described as "...a trailblazer whose impact on the community is far and wide. ... She's made significant contributions to the Telfair Museum, the Jepson Center, the Georgia Historical Society, and is active in numerous other organizations throughout the community."

Levitt is a native of Chicago, where her mother was a nurse. While her father endured a lengthy recuperation from cancer-related surgery, 10-year-old Kathy cared for him at home while her mother worked. Witnessing her mother's dedication to both family and community reinforced the value of service, and led young Kathy into her own career in nursing. Her husband, Dr. Robert O. Levitt, enjoyed a rewarding career as a physician in Chicago for many years before his retirement in 1980.

The Branigar Organization, which developed the Landings, had a significant presence in the Chicago area; and, in December of 1979, the Levitts visited Savannah to evaluate the city as a possible retirement destination. However, they returned home early, as a winter storm threatened to close O'Hare

Airport. Their plane was the last to make a white-knuck-le landing before flights in and out of the Windy City were grounded. But their abbreviated visit provided enough inspiration to make a decision. By 1982, the couple had moved into their new home on Skidaway Island.

Levitt soon learned of Mary Telfair, and the Savannah icon's service to women, medicine, and the arts. Meanwhile, Dr. Levitt became director of public health at the Landings, as well as president of the Coastal Georgia Archaeological Society before his death in 1998.

In 1986, Levitt helped organize the Heart Ball on behalf of the Savannah Chatham Heart Association, of which she is a past president. "They were just building the Plantation (now Palmetto) Club, and we brought in Lewis Grizzard, who was Georgia's honorary heart fund chairman." The Atlanta humorist entertained more than 200 guests, prompting a move to the Hyatt to accommodate a larger audience the following year.

Levitt is perhaps best known for helping launch what is now the popular SmartWomen Expo, hosted by St. Joseph/Candler. The annual event originated in the early 1990s, when the Savannah Symphony Women's Guild hosted A Tribute to Women on the Go, a lunch and fashion show in March to coincide with Women's History Month. Partnering with Mary Telfair Women's Hospital, the event recruited local doctors, lawyers, and other high-profile women as models.

In 2001, as the symphony dissolved, St.

Joseph's and Candler Hospitals were merging. Levitt encouraged Mary Telfair Women's Hospital to continue supporting the event. "I'd have over 600 women at the lunch and fashion show, with an expo," she says. "That was the whole idea, this exchange of ideas and so forth; connections."

Since then, the annual St. Joseph's/Candler SmartWomen Expo and Luncheon has raised more than \$2 million to help provide access to mammograms for women throughout the Coastal Empire.

In the autumn of 1996, Levitt helped organize the Telfair Museum's inaugural photography exhibit, thanks in part to her sister-in-law, noted photographer Helen Levitt (1913 – 2009). Her images captured and chronicled New York City street life in the mid-20th Century, and form the foundation of the Telfair's photography collection. Her connections to other photographers – particularly her father-in-law, Nickolas Muray – helped broaden the collection even further. The Telfair's Levitt Gallery has sponsored annual photography camps for area youth. For almost 25 years, these camps have introduced photography to young shutterbugs, instilling confidence and creativity.

Levitt chaired the Art of Great Fashion at the Telfair Museum, an annual fundraiser that began in 2001. The fashion show helped raise more than \$50,000 for the museum during the five years of her chairmanship.

Levitt recruited Philippe Cousteau to help launch the Gray's Reef and National Marine Ocean Film Festival in memory of her husband, who was an avid scuba diver (he even wrote the first manual). In addition, she organized "A Fishy Affair," an annual dinner to raise funds and awareness to taste lionfish. "It's an omega-3 white fish, that is edible," she says, "and local chef's share dishes made from this invasive



species."

Levitt is deeply involved with the Georgia Historical Society (GHS). "I've been with them 26 years," she says. "Originally, I was part of their fundraising group."

Academics is of keen interest to Levitt, who has been active with the Center for Low Country Studies, a conglomeration of history

and archaeology departments from Armstrong/Georgia Southern, the GHS, and the Coastal Georgia Archaeological Society. "The idea is to offer seminars on various subjects, such as the rice crops, and the forts – Jackson, McAlister, and Pulaski," she explains. "There was a huge plantation near Midway that raised indigo, a great export from Savannah for manufacturing denim."

Other organizations to benefit from Levitt's service include Coastal

ife is full of hard decisions. None may be as important as making choices regarding our healthcare, especially in the face of serious illness. That's when an advance directive can help. An advance directive is a document stating your choices regarding medical treatment, such as being placed on a ventilator or needing weekly dialysis.

Dr. Anthony Costrini is St. Joseph's/Candler's ethicist and a long-time Savannah physician. Costrini recently received the Hero in Healthcare Ethics award from the Emory Healthcare Ethics Consortium. He is a strident proponent of advance directives for adults. At minimum, he believes each of us should consider creating an advance directive. In his 50 years of critical care medicine, Costrini has encountered too many patients who did not have anyone designated to make decisions on their behalf. He has witnessed many family disagreements when a difficult healthcare decision for a loved one was required.

"I know it's tough," Costrini concedes. "Nobody wants to think about giving up control of their decisions or thoughts of dying. But sometimes these difficult questions are easier to address before they come up."

Start with a simple question: Who do you trust to be your surrogate – the person who will honor your wishes and make healthcare choices for you if you can't? It could be your spouse, a sibling, a close friend, or anyone you trust. Then, start having conversations with your surrogate, as well as your physician(s), about your healthcare wishes. But keep in mind, an advance directive is not written in stone. It's okay to change your mind down the road.

At St. Joseph's/Candler, when you are admitted to the hospital, you or a loved one fills out admission paperwork. One of the questions

asked is if you have an advance directive. If you do, a copy is entered into your medical records, if it is not already present there. If you do not have one, you are asked if you'd like to speak to somebody regarding advance directives. This person can counsel you through the process.

Live smart

It's the physician's responsibility to be aware of your advance directive and talk to you and your surrogate about it, as well as all the pros and cons regarding your circumstances. "We want to discuss whether doing everything is always the best thing, because in

some cases doing 'everything' is not the best thing," Costrini explains. "And it might not be anywhere near what the patient prefers, and that's why an advance directive is so very important."

National Healthcare Decisions Day, which was just a few weeks ago, was established to encourage everyone to tackle this topic. People should make decisions in advance so that loved ones can follow their specific wishes when necessary. Make those decisions known to your surrogate and complete a simple advance directive form. Guidance is available from the Georgia Advance Directive for Healthcare form (which can be found at sjchs.org), or the Five Wishes document, which also is honored in this state. In Georgia, you do not need a lawyer involved or the document to be notarized, unless you wish. In South Carolina, your advance directive may need to be notarized. Whittlesey, who valiantly led the 1st Battalion, 308th Infantry Regiment - the Lost Battalion of World War I. The unit's activities were chronicled in a previous installment of this column.

After high school, he attended Williams College, where he was very active in student activities, cultivating leadership skills that would serve him well as an officer in the U.S. Army. As America's involvement in the war in Europe became more likely, Whittlesey volunteered for duty at the training camp in Plattsburg, New York. He completed his training in August of 1916, and was called to active duty the following year. He joined thousands of other American "Doughboys"

However, due to heavy casualty rates, he was soon promoted to major, in command of a fighting force which would become known as the "Lost Battalion." who were either walking wounded, missing in action, or taken prisoner. Whittlesey was the last man out. He would soon be promoted to lieutenant colonel. On December 24, 1918, he was awarded a Medal of Honor for his leadership against superior numbers in the Argonne Forest of France during some of the toughest days of World War I.

After the war, Whittlesey returned to his law practice and later found rewarding work with the Red Cross. But he found it difficult to shake the hero status imposed on him by the press. According to the press, he was a hero, but he continued to wonder if he could have saved more of his men by accepting the German offer of surrender. This unfair criticism was dispelled by the military, but it undoubtedly hindered his adjustment to civilian life. Adding to his mental discomfort, many of his soldiers appealed to him for support and advice in overcoming their own challenges.

On November 11, 1921, Whittlesey participated in the burial of the first Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. Two weeks later he boarded, the *SS Toloa* bound for Havana, Cuba. On the evening of November 26, 1921, Whittlesey dined at the captain's table and appeared to be in good spirits. He finished off the evening in the smoking salon, where he talked for two hours on a wide range of subjects, including the Army-Navy football game that day. It was the last time this distinguished combat veteran was ever seen alive. After retiring for the evening, he threw himself overboard and perished in the rough waters between Cuba and the U.S. He left letters in his cabin addressed to relatives and friends, and instructions to the captain of the *Toloa* for the disposition of his baggage. Whittlesey's suicide was front-page news, although those close to him were not surprised.
